We are in receipt of the following
 letter from Thys Winkel, who now
 is laboring for the church in the
 Holland mission field:

Alkmaar, Holland
November 11, 1923.

Dear Mr. Markus:

Well I suppose that by this time
 you think that T. Winkel is dead
 and buried in the Atlantic or sunk
 to ruin.

I surely had a successful and an
 enjoyable trip. The rest seemed to
 do me considerable good. After
 leaving Salt Lake there were 13
 (rather an unlucky number) of us
 all on our way to Europe, 7 of us
 labor in Holland, 4 in Germany and
 2 in England.

Friday morning, October 26, we
 left harbor at Montreal on the steam
 ship Montrose. It is a beautiful ship,
 over a block long and one of the
 most modern equipped steamers on
 the Atlantic. They have their own
 orchestra, motion picture machine
 and entertainment de luxe was en-
 joyed every night. Utah was well
 represented on the English boat. A
 few of us song birds got together
 and the result was that we sang for
 the guests at night. Before getting
 off the ship we were known as the
 "Montrose Warblers" and special
 programs were put out to this
 effect. We were on the ship eight

days and as the weather was fine
 none of us got the least bit sea sick.

We landed in Liverpool at 3 p. m.
 Saturday, November 3, where we at-
 tended a special meeting at the home
 of President McKay (President of
 European mission). We then took
 the train through England to Har-
 wich where we parted and the re-
 mainder (?) of us journeyed on to
 the Land of Dykes. Holland is sur-
 ely a beautiful place. We were wel-
 comed by several Utah boys waiting
 for us at Rotterdam. Holland is in-
 deed a land of exquisite beauty, and
 when you take the Dutchman and
 all his old country ideas into consid-
 eration I am very certain that Quinn
 and I shall enjoy our mission here.

It is impossible to give suitable
 thanks to the way our Richfield
 friends treated me. Words can't
 explain the appreciation that I wish-
 ed to extend to them all. I never
 really realized how many friends I
 had until I have been compelled to
 leave them. However, I can assure
 them all I shall keep them close to
 my heart and remember them fore-
 ever.

I surely will enjoy reading our
 home town news out here in Hol-
 land. It's hard to realize how far
 it is—but you have crossed the wat-
 ers and you no doubt know how far
 little Richfield is from Europe. I'll
 thank you again for the Reaper, for
 I'll get more enjoyment out of it
 than even letters from home.

Praying the Lord to bless you, and
 wishing yourself and Mrs. Markus
 the best of success, and with best re-
 gards to the "Reaper force" I am,

"THYS" WRITES FROM HOLLAND

Young Richfield Missionary Talks
Interestingly In Splendid Letter.

Thys, you are a brick! The editor compliments you and congratulates you on the spiritual and mental growth your recent letter to the Reaper testifies to. And if the large family of Reaper readers should not believe that our compliments and congratulations are well earned, let them judge for themselves. Here is the letter:

Rotterdam, Holland, June 27th,
1924.

The Richfield Reaper, Richfield,
Utah, U. S. A.

Dear Dr. Markus:

Hello Dr. Can you print me 100 dog-ears and have them ready in 30 minutes? Sounds like old times, doesn't it?

Well the old clock has ticked off another eight months since you last heard from me, although it seems like yesterday. I often wonder why the time passes so rapidly, especially for the missionaries; probably it's because they are always busy, and perhaps the change of life has a great deal to do with it.

The Reaper never fails to find its destination. I can always find it in the mail box every Thursday morning just two weeks after it is sent. And upon its arrival everything is shifted aside until its contents are observed and read with an interesting desire to know who's who and what's what in little far away Richfield. After it has been read (I almost read the type off from it from one end to another) it goes to Quinn and he informs me that he is always looking forward for the Reaper in order to learn what friends are doing in his choice town.

We have just held our semi-annual Rotterdam Conference, which continued for five days. Elders from Germany, England and South Africa were present, including Apostle McKay (President of European Mission) and Pres. Padje from the Swiss and German mission.

The majority of speakers were Americans, speaking in the English language and translated by one of our Dutch missionaries. There were hundreds of people present—many of them having an earnest desire to investigate Mormonism. And as the conference was well advertised to the effect that real American speakers would be present it created quite a sensation among the natives of Holland.

Guy (English) missionary meeting continued for 2½ hours in succession with but five minutes recreation, but was thoroughly enjoyed by all those present. So we are all full of the spirit to go ahead and try to find people who are willing to accept our messages.

The city of Rotterdam surely is noisy; street peddlers shriek out their wares; the Hollanders yell to you to get out of their way; the pavements are of cobbles, and every vehicle rattles.

The automobiles are not as numerous as they are at home, by far, however, they are gradually taking the place of the dog carts and other carts pulled by man or a small pony. The Hollanders have no speed laws and their driving is more reckless than John's, my heart has taken a permanent lodging in my throat, and I jump about as though I had St. Vitus' dance in trying to keep out of the way of the motor cars. The Main street of Rotterdam is only wide enough for two cars to pass, and the fatted chauffeurs fly in and out, grazing the little Dutch street cars at a speed which would cause their arrest in Chicago. Even the street cars are dangerous. The side walks (if there are any) are often not more than two feet in width and

the cars are apt to skin one's leg as they pass. They go like mad, and the ringing of their bells vies with the honking of the automobiles.

Quinn tells me that if perchance you should mention the "Dutch twins" name through the columns of the Reeper to assure everyone that Richfield is not forgotten by him; and believe me its well represented in Holland even though we have but two representatives.

We both join in our heartfelt thanks for all the support our Richfield friends gave us, and I assure you they are often thought of—even though 7000 miles or more away.

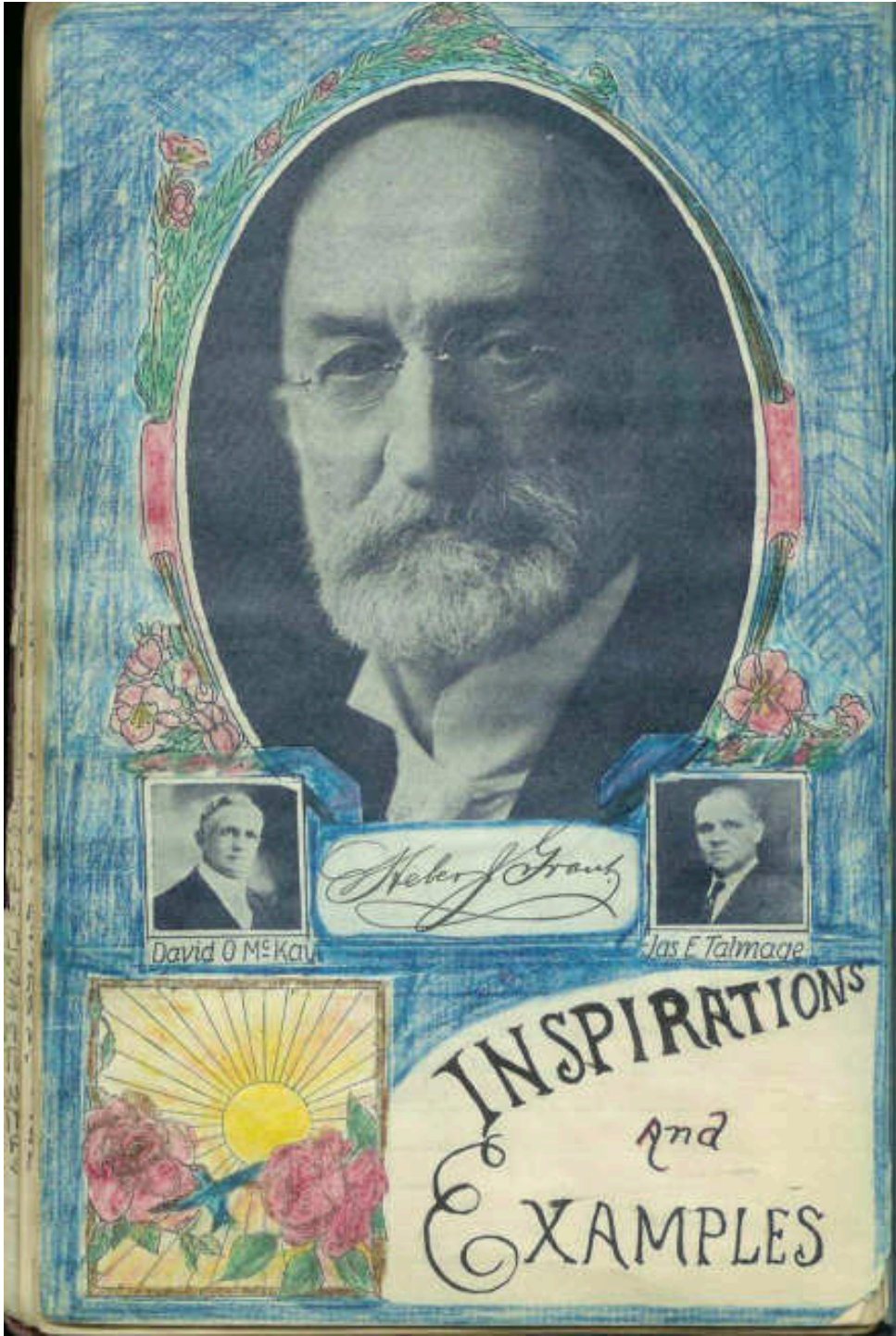

Mormonen-propaganda.

Het „Hollandsch Presidentschap“ te Salt Lake City, Utah (Noord-Amerika), gaf op 2 Januarij 11. een afschouwfierje aan den heer A. de Bruyn, die naar Nederland zou trekken om daar menschen te winnen voor het Mormonisme.

Men zij gewaarschuwd. Bedriegelijk zijn niet alleen de leeringen van het Mormonisme (o.a. oorkening van de leer der Heilige Driëenheid, zoo fondamenteel voor alle ware religie), maar bedriegelijk zijn ook de voorstellingen die Mormoonsche zedelingen in Europa geven omtrent toestanden in het land van de Heiligen der Laatste Dagen, zooals de volgelingen van Smith en Brigham Young zich gaarne noemen.

„Het Oosten“, een Amerikaansch weekblad, deelt in een schrijven uit het Mormonenland het volgende mede:

„In Nederland wordt door de Mormoonsche zedelingen verteld, dat hier in Utah, waar de Tempel Gods staat gebouwd in de toppen der bergen, geen dan-walzen, geen knippen van onkruid, geen politie noodig is, dat hier niet wordt gerookt, geen koffie en thee, geen sterken drank wordt gedronken, geen armoede en gebrek wordt gekend, dat hier alles even rein en heilig is en dat het volk, de heiligen, hier vreedzaam en in liefde met en onder elkander wonen en leven.

Maar zij die hierheen emigreren, zullen van al dat schoon hier maar bitter weinig aantreffen en vinden, want hier in Salt Lake City zijn ruim vijftig Mormoonsche vergaderingsgebouwen, waarin elke Zondag Zondagschool en des avonds zoogenaamde goddienst-afening wordt gehouden. Maar aan elk gebouw is verbonden een „amusement“-hall, of studeerzalen en verstaanbaarde uitgedrukt, een dansaal, waarin dansavonden en tooneelvoeringen worden gehouden tegen betaling van toegangsgeld. Elke Zondagavond vóór de goddienstafening een zangavond bestaat en

voor het sacrament of avondmaal wordt bedient, wordt door den bisschop of door een zijner raadgevers afgekondigd wat er in die week nogal te doen zal zijn en hoeveel intreegeld er voor gegeven zal worden, en gewoontlijk is er in elke zaal of lokal iederen avond wat te doen.

En buiten deze ruim vijftig zalen, die het ambtelijk en plechtig zijn van de Mormoonsche Kerk, waarin danspartijen en tooneelvoeringen worden gehouden in hier in Salt Lake City, of in de onmiddellijke nabijheid van deze stad, de grootste en wereldberoemde dansaal of Salair, wederom een productie van de Mormoonsche Kerk, en waarin het dierlijke allebehalve netjes en fatsoenlijk toezigt.

Verder, indien men denkt dat er in Salt Lake City geen huizen van onkruid aantreffen worden, dan moet men zelf eens een kofje gaan nemen in het westelike gedeelte van deze stad, waarin alleen niet die huizen, maar ook huizen van waarzeggers en kaartleggers te vinden zijn bij tientallen.

„Toch ware te verwachten dat er in Salt Lake City geen politie noodig was. Neen, Zamen in Salt Lake City bevestigen politiemagisten bepaald te kort, want daarvoor vonden er personen aangehouden en gebouwen beroofd van alles wat zij bezitten en wat van waarde in te vinden is. Moorden en diefstal komen hier in Salt Lake City even goed voor als in andere plaatsen van Amerika, en het zijn alleen geen niet-Mormonen deze dingen bedrijven. Neen, ook Mormonen of zoogenaamde Heiligen der Laatste Dagen maken zich hiervan evenveel schuldig.

In Utah, dat ongeveer een half millioen inwoners telt, hadden in 1924 meer moorden plaats dan in de groote stad Londen, die in dat vijf miljoen inwoners telt.

Onze Nederlandische bladen worden de meeleefdegen uit Amerika omtrent het land in de Mormonenstad, wel verder verbruikt ter waarschuwing.

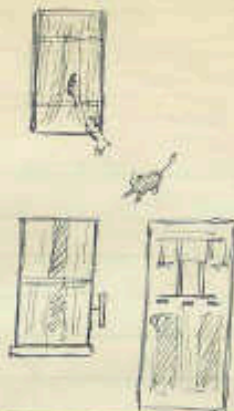
